Year 10 and Year 11 Examinations

The Year 10 and Year 11 Examinations concluded today. I hope that all students approached these seriously and completed them to the best of their ability. In November, students in all year levels will be completing examinations as sitting examinations is a skill that requires practice over a number of years. Therefore, students must reflect not only on the result but on the level of preparation that took place throughout semester one. When the students receive their examinations next week, it is important to note the score as well as looking at each question and identifying areas of strength and areas for further improvement.

As we approach the end of Semester One, it is time to reflect on what worked well, and identify what to focus on next semester. I like the quote attributed to Albert Einstein which focusses our thinking on the need to do something differently if we desire a different outcome. The holidays give us time to think about what we need to do differently next semester if we desire a different result. In the last edition of The Beacon, we spoke a little about developing a growth mindset. The first step is to notice when we have a fixed mindset about our learning and then we can change the self-talk. The following quote from the current Year 12 English text *Runaway* by Alice Munro is inspiring as we focus on making positive changes: "The road is easy if you know how to travel light." Making the shift from a fixed mindset to a growth mindset can help to make travelling light. Last Wednesday, the staff worked productively in meetings, collaborating and planning in teams and we enjoyed pizza for lunch. An example of one of the activities was what our Literacy Leader, Ms Lexie Huculak called a "Literacy Crafternoon". Teachers and Learning Support Officers created resources to enhance student literacy skills.

We will begin the Assumption Term with Day 2 of the Berry Street Education Model training for all staff. We look forward to the Grandparents' Mass which will take place soon after the beginning of the term on 26 July. The invitations will be sent out via Operoo next week. 


FROM THE DEPUTY PRINCIPAL, STAFF AND LEARNING OPERATIONS Mr Bryson

In Victoria, we have witnessed the extraordinary endeavours of educators in all sectors, responding to multiple lockdowns throughout the past two years. In the school sector, remote schooling has been provided for more than 40 per cent of the available school days during this time.

The above extract is from a recent publication shared with Victorian school leaders. The full report draws reference to the current challenges faced across most schools and explains that whilst lockdowns now seem to have ended, the effects of the pandemic are continuing. These include factors such as ongoing COVID-related student and teacher absences, gaps in student learning and the increased wellbeing needs of young people as they transition from extended periods of remote learning.



As we head into the break, can I also ask all families to do a bit of an inventory with their young person. Please check that they have a full correct uniform, that they have all the equipment they need to facilitate their learning, and that they work on developing a growth academic mindset. Carol Dweck, professor of psychology at Stanford University, shares the power of "yet" in this video. We will work with our young people over the coming months on the power of "yet" where we will explore how we grow as learners. Hopefully, this will assist our young people in improving their academic results and develop in them a greater grit and tenacity needed to face challenges in their life.

So, happy end of Term 2 and Happy Holidays! I extend to all our families my gratitude for the partnership we work in, for the support we have from you, and for the joy your young people bring to our communal life. I look forward to continuing our relationship in the coming months. Here are some tips that can help you have positive and constructive conversations with your child.

- Being genuinely interested and curious about what your child is telling you.
- Giving them your undivided attention.
- Show empathy put yourself in your child's shoes.
- Avoid just giving them instructions or unsolicited advice.


Choose a quiet space without distractions for important conversations.

gave us a week each of their time on this three week experience.



FROM THE LEARNING AREA LEADER, HUMANITIESMs Saliba

On Monday 30 May the Year 10 World War 2 class visited the Holocaust Museum. Students have been studying the Holocaust in class and have been looking at the impact this historical event has had on generations past and present.

Students spent the first half of the day engaging with primary resources and artefacts from the War. They participated in a workshop where they explored themes of discrimination and dehumanisation, as well as themes of hope and new beginnings. The day was full of both reflection and inspiration for our young people. Students read translated notices and newspapers that were circulated during World War 2 and learnt about the impact of propaganda. Students also held a food-ration card and a ration bowl that was given to the Jewish people at the start of the war. This was a confronting moment for our students as they began to acknowledge the reality of the treatment of Jewish people during the war.

The most inspiring part of the day was when students heard the firsthand story of Holocaust survivor, 93-year-old Szaja Chaskiel. Szaja shared the story of his life, beginning with his childhood pre-war where he went to school and played with his friends, right through to his time in Auschwitz concentration camp. He retold the story of the murder of his father by Nazi soldiers and his escape from a labour camp at 11 years old. Following this, he shared stories of kindness and compassion, when a Catholic priest housed and protected him. Szaja shared his experience on the death -walk, where he walked through snow for eight days and eight nights with no food or water, and students witnessed the tattooed numbers on his arm. It was a truly

emotional experience.

Students left the excursion with a sense of hope. While Szaja's story is one of trauma and loss, he shared moments of kindness to hold on to. John urged students to be kind in their lives and to "not-hate." His story is one that will resonate with us for a long time and students were grateful to have been able to experience his story firsthand. FROM THE HEAD OF HEALTH AND PHYSICAL EDUCATION Mr Gilham

As we approach the end of term, students across all year levels have been working hard to on assessment tasks and preparing for upcoming exams.

Year 7 students are currently working in groups to create an original PE game that their classmates are able to play. Students are required to create, trial and refine their game and provide an instruction card. When presenting to the class, students are required to set-up, explain the rules and lead participation in the game.

Year 8 students have completed a research task exploring the health benefits of Physical Activity. Students identified the type of activity they have participated in, outline the levels of physical activity, sedentary behaviour and sleep required for students of their age and identify the local fitness and recreational services available to them on a map of their local area.

Year 9 Elite Sports Performance students recently had a visit from Invicta Performance and completed a Sports Nutrition session in which they had the opportunity to create a healthy snack. Students worked in small groups and were very eager to outdo each other and create the best protein balls. 



INGREDIENTS

- 1 cup drippy all-natural peanut butter or any nut butter (try almond, or ABC spread)
- 1/3 cup vanilla protein powder (regular whey or plant protein)
- 1/2 cup rolled oats
- · 1 tablespoon chia seeds
- · 2 tablespoons honey
- 1/4 cup mini chocolate chips (use dairy-free for vegan)
- 1-4 teaspoons water as needed

DIRECTIONS

- Place peanut butter, protein powder, rolled oats, chia seeds, honey, and mini chocolate chips into a medium bowl.
- Use a wooden spoon or your hands to mix the dough together. At this point, begin to add water by the teaspoon.
- Depending on how drippy your peanut butter is, you'll need to add more or less water.
 The water not only helps moisten things so your balls hold shape, but they actually help your balls become less chalky.
- Scoop about 1 tbsp of dough into your palm. Roll into balls until all dough is gone.
 You should get somewhere between 14-16 balls.
- Store in the refrigerator for up to a week or in the freezer for up to 3 months.
