

Looking Forward to 2022 with a New and Exciting Approach

Term three in schools is always exciting as we find ourselves working in the current year as well as planning for the next academic year. As a part of our ongoing reflection and review of our practices, over the past 12 months the wellbeing leaders at the College, led by the Heads of School and the Year Level Coordinators have been discussing how to improve our processes and practices to further enhance our work with our students.

Over the past year, Mr Holmes and Mr Bryson have been sharing our vision for a holistic learning and teaching experience through the development of our Thomas Carr Model of Instructional Practice which represents in a simple diagram the interconnectedness of wellbeing and learning.

In alignment with, and arising from the research, thinking and work undertaken to create our pedagogical model for learning at Thomas Carr College, we have decided to restructure our Senior School – Years 10-12.

From 2022 we will be making a shift into a vertical structure whereby Year 10, 11 &12 students will be allocated into Pastoral and Learning Mentor Groups instead of year level based Homegroups. This is combined with broadening the scope of our well-established House System; therefore, these groups will be organised according to House. In the Senior School, House Leaders, instead of Year Level Coordinators will be responsible for the students in collaboration with the Pastoral and Learning Mentors.

At this stage, the Middle School will remain in the horizontal year level structure with the introduction of House-based Mentor Groups and enhancement of the Homeroom Teacher role by creating Pastoral and Learning Mentor Groups. The objective is for Pastoral and Leaning Mentors to accompany their Mentor Group for three years which means that they will be able to develop strong relationships and support their students more effectively.


This change in the structure will also provide richer leadership opportunities for those



students who take on the roles of House Captain as House leadership will shift beyond sporting carnivals and House activities.

Over the coming weeks we will provide more infor-

mation regarding these exciting changes and the many benefits they will provide through various forums, including College assemblies and future Beacon articles. On Tuesday September 7, the focus of the Parent Forum will be to discuss this change for 2022.





Student Leadership 2022

Next week the process will begin for the selection of the College Captains and College Vice Captains for next year. The Year 11 Co-ordinators, Ms Lear and Mr Stark will be launching the student the student leadership program on Tuesday. Applications close on Friday August 20. The next phase of the Student Leadership program is the launch of the new House Captain role descriptions and the selection process. We encourage as many students as possible to consider leadership opportunities and to engage with the process.

LEARNING@HOME

In response to the announcement that Victoria would enter a 7-day lockdown, the College has implemented our LEARNING@HOME program for this period of remote and flexible learning.

To assist with this transition, please take note of the following key information:

- As of Friday 6 August, students will attend Homeroom and access their classes online using MS TEAMS.
- Homeroom and all scheduled classes will be held online as per the current College timetable from 8.43am to 3.20pm.
- Students are encouraged to check their timetable on SIMON and Class Pages for lesson details.

Updated information has been posted on the Daily Messages section on SIMON including a checklist that students may use to ensure that they are fully prepared to ENGAGE and CONNECT with their learning throughout LEARNING@HOME.

We appreciate your understanding throughout this time, and we will continue to keep you updated on all relevant information. In the meantime, please check Operoo and PAM for regular updates.

Tutor Learning Program

The College's Tutor Learning Program will continue during this period of remote learning. Tutors will contact teachers to access their classes via MS TEAMS and create a

2021 General Achievement Test (GAT)


Feast Day of St Anne and St Joachim – July 26: Honouring our Grandparents

St Joachim and St Anne were the parents of Jesus' mother, Mary. Their love for one another and for Mary is an example to us of how God calls us to live. They also remind us to honour our own grandparents and to thank them for the blessings they have passed down to us in love. As Pope Francis reminds us, "The prayer of grandparents and of the elderly is a great gift for the Church! It is to be treasured. It is a great injection of wisdom for the whole of society... Grandparents and the elderly are a wealth not to be ignored."

Our annual Grandparents Day Mass and Breakfast on this feast day had to be cancelled













this year because of the recent COVID restrictions. However, we will honour grandparents in our community on Monday Sept 6 when we celebrate the Father's Day Mass and Breakfast. At this mass, we will honour the special role that Fathers and Grandparents play in the lives of us all. Mass will be held in the Performing Arts Centre at 8.00 am, celebrated by Fr Silvio Bezzina mssp, followed by breakfast. More details will follow in the coming weeks.

Feast Days in August – In Celebration of Women in the Church

During the month of August, we celebrate the feast days of a number of women who hold a special place in the life of our church. At this time, it is appropriate to honour and name some of these women of faith who inspire us all – particularly women – to remember how critical our roles are within the church of today.

August 8 - Feast Day of St Mary of the Cross Mackillop - A Prophetic Catholic Woman

Mary Mackillop was a brave and determined woman who has had the honour of being named Australia's first (and only) saint. Mary was born in Melbourne, Victoria in 1842. When Mary was 18, she went to work as a teacher in Penola, a small town in South Australia, where she met Father Julian Tension Woods. Both Mary and Father Julian wanted to do something for children who parents could not afford to send them to school. Together, in 1866, they began the first St Joseph's School in an old stable. Many young women joined Mary in her work for the poor, and so began the Sisters of St Joseph.

Mary was a contemporary of Archbishop Thomas Carr. He was a great supporter of Mary's work. She included many references to Thomas Carr, and so we can learn a lot about our patron, Archbishop Thomas Carr, by reflecting on Mary's journal.

One of her mottos was 'Never see a need without doing something about it.' Her simple life was lived in a way that provides inspiration for us today.

August 11 - Feast Day of St Clare of Assisi

On August 10, we celebrate the feast day of St Clare, the patroness of one of our parish primary schools, St Clare's in Truganina. Clare (1193 - 1253) was born into one of the wealthy families of Assisi in Italy. She loved fine things as a teenager but was also drawn inwardly to a life of service. At seventeen, she heard Francis of Assisi, the monk who repaired churches and ministered to the sick, speak and say: "When there is poverty with joy, there is inner peace." A year later, she decided to follow in his footsteps by giving up her life of wealth. She went on to establish her own religious order, 'the poor Clare's.' On this day, we especially remember and hold in prayer all those from the school community of St Clare's: the students (past and current), staff and families.

August 15 - The Feast Day of the Assumption


On August 15, we celebrate the feast of the Assumption of Mary into heaven. We honour her and all women who lead us to Christ through their examples of courage and love. Mary plays different parts in Catholics' devotion to Mary. She is most often seen as our mother. People also relate to Mary as the person who most closely followed Jesus' example and lived a life totally devoted to doing God's will. The College community will celebrate mass on Tuesday August 17 in honour of Mary, Mother of God, whose example of great courage reminds us that God calls ordinary people like us to participate in extraordinary ways to help build God's kingdom. Mary became Jesus' first disciple and thus she is a model for all of us who choose to follow Him.

Understanding the New World of Work

One of the most important aspects of being a Career Practitioner is to understand how the World of Work is changing and to ensure that our students are as prepared as possible for what the not-too- distant future brings. Excitingly, the world of work has never changed as rapidly as it currently is. Technology, automation and globalisation are fundamentally reshaping our world and have reached into every aspect of our lives from Health to Education to Business and Communication. There is much research undertaken and a variety of reports and statistics that estimate how many of the current jobs will no longer exist by 2030. With these statistics ranging between 3% - 15%, there is some uncertainty there. The one certainty is that there will be change in each and every job and that change will continue to occur.

So what does this mean in terms of what characteristics and experience our students need to successfully gain and retain employment, and in the 21st century?

The Career Education Association of Victoria, along with leading industry advisors have identified the key traits highly sought by employers that will not only assist our students in obtaining employment, after their secondary and/or tertiary studies, but also keep them employable in being able to transfer their (non-technical) skills to other jobs and industries. These transferrable skills are commonly referred to as '21st century Employability Skills.'

Obtaining a post-school education is simply not enough anymore. Prospective employees must demonstrate some work experience (formal and informal) as this shows that they have strong interpersonal skills and are socially engaged.

What employers want/desire:

- A good qualification that is based on the core skills/operational aspect of the job
- Awareness of what the industry is expecting of you!
- Knowledge of company culture, own self, and employer expectations
- Sound communication, including good emotional intelligence (writing, speaking, listening)
- Service orientation
- Another language (or part of)
- Good networks
- Ability to network and move out of comfort zone
- Good IT skills
- Critical thinking
- Collaboration
- Good problem-solving skills (ability to look at all possibilities and answers)

Digital skills (all 4 are essential):

- Digital Literacy (ability to critically analyse online information (fake versus real)
- Digital Skills (universal expression UX, Video, computing, search engines more than first 3 links in google search, optimisation, algorithms, programming, design)
- Digital Emotional Intelligence (read between the lines, include self-awareness (empathy), social skills when writing/reading emails)
- Digital Personal Branding (the footprints you leave)

How can we all work together to assist our students to do this?

Thomas Carr College provides our students with many opportunities to ensure they gain the necessary experiences and characteristics which will assist them to demonstrate their employability.

Leadership opportunities within the College for all students include: College and Middle School Captains, House Captains, Liturgy, Social Justice, Student Representative Council, College Student Ambassadors and Peer Support Leadership. Our students continue to lead events and activities, engage in community service and volunteer externally. These opportunities assist in developing team work, interpersonal skills and collaboration, emotional intelligence, communication, empathy, problem solving and networking

with a variety of staff, student and other College stakeholders.

All students engage in many classroom activities which assists their team work, creativity and problem-solving skills. They also have curriculum opportunities that provide the opportunity to travel overseas (currently on hold) and ensure they are culturally aware and are becoming global citizens.

The Career Education program at Thomas Carr College ensures students have a variety of exposure and engagement with industries in the forms of guest speakers and the compulsory work experience and mock interview programs. Students become aware of the 21st century world of work and the importance of career management through their career counselling sessions and career education lessons. In the senior years, students are also provided with opportunities and tools that enable them to thoroughly research their post year 12 courses and opportunities to ensure they remain actively engaged with industry activities and continue to be immersed in activities and events that continue them on the right track of remaining highly employable.

In addition to the compulsory work experience program at the College, students are also highly encouraged to engage in part-time/casual work. This does not necessarily need to be in the formal sense, but could possibly include coaching a sporting team or volunteering at a local community organisation.

Finally, we must continue to remind our students that they are already acquiring many of these '21st century Employability Skills' and that in addition to achieving as well as they can academically, they need to be well-rounded individuals with a balanced approach to their learning and experiences.


Student Reflections
