Headstart Program

The Headstart program will commence on Monday 29 November and conclude on the final day of the Advent Term, Friday 3 December.

A brief outline of each day is listed below for your reference.

Monday 29 November (Semester Two timetable)

All Year 7 to 11 classes will continue based on the current Semester Two timetable (Monday 'A' timetable) and will include Examination feedback sessions for Year 9, 10 and 11 students.

Tuesday 30 November to Thursday 2 December (2022 Timetable)

As of Tuesday 30 November, all year levels will commence their 2022 classes rolling over to their Semester One timetable.

Friday 3 December (Final day of the Advent Term)

Students will be in classes based on the 2022 Semester One timetable (periods 1 and 2).

End of Year Advent Mass (periods 3 and 4).

Pastoral Activities and year level assemblies (periods 5 and 6).

In addition to the above details, please note:

- Current Year 8 students will also be participating in an alternative SHINE program throughout the week.
- VCAL students will also be involved in other set activities on Wednesday and Thursday.
- ACER PAT Testing will be held for Year 8, 9, and 10 students on Wednesday 1 December (periods 1 and 2).

Further information outlining the above activities has been shared with individual students and please contact your child's Homeroom Teacher or Year Level Co-ordinator with any questions. A detailed outline of the Headstart program is also available for students to view on the Daily Messages section on SIMON and a copy has been posted on PAM for families to access.

We look forward to the commencement of our Headstart program and wish your child all the best for next week.

Year 11 Art Students Embrace Indigenous Art

Earlier this term, I had the wonderful opportunity to visit the Year 11 Art students and share in their final presentations as part of their work and ongoing project with artist Cassie Leatham.

It was a privilege to witness their presentations and hear how their personal stories inspired their artwork. It was equally impressive to see how open they were in expressing this in front of their peers, and I congratulate each of them for this.

Below is a reflection highlighting the work undertaken by this class, and I wish to acknowledge their teacher, Ms Mary Udovicic who initiated this project and applaud



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her work and passion in guiding these students through this amazing journey.

During 2021, Year 11 Art students worked with artist Cassie Leatham, a Taungurung/ Wurundjeri woman of the Kulin Nation exploring traditional weaving techniques. COVID-19 lockdowns certainly challenged the collaboration as face-to-face workshops could not be facilitated with all workshops being held online.

However, the students persevered and created works that represented their family story, culture and ambitions. On Friday 9 November, students presented their final artworks to Cassie via Microsoft Teams. It was a moving experience to hear the rich stories that inspired each work.

In addition to this working collaboration the College commissioned Cassie to produce a 'Healing Mat' for the College to keep. This work will be delivered to the College early in December 2021.

"The colours in the work represent collaboration and skill-sharing and an acknowledgement of the ones before us, the traditional owners. Woven entirely by hand, this healing mat contains native bird feathers I've collected from Country. It also represents the stories of the staff and students from Thomas Carr College Art class who shared this journey with me and enriched their knowledge of weaving. The feathers used in the work reflect the strength of the emu, strong and resilient, with each feather giving the soft nurturing feel of love and respect. Emu feathers are used as they signify keeping one safe while travelling, secure and protected"





Under current laws, Catholic organisations – along with other Christian, Jewish, Islamic and all faith-based educational establishments – have the right to choose to hire employees who are dedicated to upholding their religious identity.

The proposed Equal Opportunity (Religious Exceptions) Amendment Bill 2021 will seriously diminish the rights of religious organisations to manage their activities according to their faith and conscience.

Industry & Enterprise (Unit 1)

Each Student in Year 10 studies VCE Industry & Enterprise (Unit 1) as a compulsory subject. Introduced to the College in 2019, Industry & Enterprise offers our students the opportunity to better understand and prepare themselves for the rapidly changing workforce. Industry and Enterprise allows our Students to develop personal career goals, apply work-related skills and plan future career pathways through a variety of Projects, including our Mock Interview Program.

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During recent weeks all Year 10 Students studying Industry and Enterprise in Semester 2 participated in the Mock Interview Program as part of their formal assessment. The Mock Interview program is designed to provide our Students with a practice job interview but aligns to a real-life scenario. This semester our students applied for a casual retail position and tailored their preparation and research for this opportunity. Our Students were then interviewed online by an industry professional and/or recruiters.

Each interview ran for 20 minutes and provided our Students the opportunity to introduce themselves, articulate their employability skills, and ask questions in a safe environment. Formal, verbal feedback was then provided to each student on their performance; on what they did well and suggestions for the future. Through this process our Students were able to prepare for a real-life situation and receive feedback on their performance but in a simulated and supportive environment, thus preparing them for future interviews outside of the College. This process also allowed our Students to network with potential employers outside of the College.

It was pleasing to see the confidence in our Students and how well they had prepared for their interview. We are also very grateful to the many outside Industry professionals who, again their time and dedication to assist our Students. The feedback from them has been very positive in both the preparation of our Students and their conduct and interview performance. Well done to all Students, you should be very proud of your achievements.

To: Members of the Victorian Legislative Assembly and Legislative Council

Concerns about the diminishing of religious freedom and the accumulation of power

Dear Honourable Member,

My prayerful greetings to you. I write to express grave misgivings I share with other faith leaders, in relation to the Equal Opportunity (Religious Exceptions) Amendment Bill 2021.

The proposed legislation diminishes the ability of faith organisations to confidently manage employment matters according to their faith and conscience.

As a point of principle, this is a serious over-reach of the Government into the rightful freedoms of faithbased organisations in Victoria. Organisations of care charity, including religious and church agencies, have a right to practice their faith without new administration burdens and pressures.

In my own context, Catholic organisations are inclusive and welcoming places, not despite but *because* they are Catholic. Across all sectors in Catholic organisational contexts, I am particularly concerned that the introduction of an 'inherent requirement' test is a serious intrusion into the expression of faith, and an unnecessary instrument of power. It will lead to vexatious claims being adjudicated by a Commissioner or the Courts, neither of which have competency to define religious matters for believers.

The Government has been unable to identify a single problem in Catholic schools with which this legislation is meant to address, and many in my community are therefore concluding that the Government means to diminish the rights of large religious communities and concurrently target religious minorities. I hope this is not the case.

To people of faith, this is looking increasingly like a willingness to hurt the rightful expression of religious faith coupled with an extravagant adoption of political power over our lives. Please see attached my statement to the media of 2 October.

With great respect to our public representatives, I urge a mature re-think on both of the above proposals, and for a fairer and democratic approach to be taken.

Equal opportunity laws - letter to state members of parliament

Dear <MP NAME>

I write to you in reference to the Victorian Government's proposed *Equal Opportunity (Religious Exceptions) Amendment Bill 2021*, which will seriously diminish the rights of religious organisations to manage their activities according to their faith and conscience.

As a parent, I have chosen to educate my child in a Catholic school because the traditions of the Church are not only passed on through what is taught, but what is practised and what is witnessed in our learning communities.

The role of teachers and support staff in my school community is more than just teaching or performing administrative duties – it is expected that they model the Catholic ethos in all aspects of their daily lives.

I am very concerned that the Victorian Government's changes might mean that Catholic schools could be forced to hire staff who are actively at odds with the teachings and ethos of the Catholic community. The proposed inherent requirements test could leave it up to a bureaucrat or a legal court to determine what a necessary or inherent aspect of a religion is, and what jobs in a school require conformity with the content of a school's religion. This poses a clear threat to the integrity of my school by severely undermining the faith and values-based education it currently provides.

The change in law appears to be written without an understanding of Catholic school communities. The principles, values and beliefs that form the culture of a Catholic school don't disappear when the bell rings at the end of the day, but are actually an inherent part of the fabric of school life.

Parents living in your electorate, like me, have a right to expect that, when they choose a Catholic school for their child's education, their child will be educated in an environment that is consistent with the teachings of the Church.

Please don't take that right away from me and my family. Please vote against the Victorian Government's proposed Equal Opportunity (Religious Exceptions) Amendment Bill.
