

With reference to the above statement and drawing upon the College's theme of 'Hope' for this year, there is a strong sense of hope in what students can achieve at Thomas Carr College. As a College community we have embraced this vision and begin the year with high expectations in our approach to student learning and how we support the learning needs of all our students.

### **Academic Excellence**

At the start of this year, we gathered as a community to celebrate the academic achievements of the Class of 2020. At this assembly, we also acknowledged the students who undertook VCAL during their senior years at Thomas Carr College, as they too were able to excel in pursuing a pathway that allowed them to shine and pursue their dreams.

In 2020, three students achieved over 90 for their ATAR with all the below listed students receiving 85% or above for their ATAR. Many of these students also received Study Scores of 40 or above for one or more subjects and have been



awarded university scholarships. This includes Atieng Maker who will be studying a Bachelor of Science at the University of Melbourne. At the end of last year, she was awarded the prestigious University of Melbourne Hansen Scholarship which is offered to only 20 recipients across Australia.

This year we were very proud to award the Thomas Carr College Dux to Sinit Berhane who received an ATAR of 98.2. Highlighting her commitment to excellence across all her subjects, Sinit received a Study Score of 40 or above in five subjects including Psychology which she completed in 2019 as a Year 11 student.



Our staff work with individuals and small groups in enhancing literacy, building communication and language, career experience and maintaining strong friendships.

Additional supports provided in class to enhance educational success include notetaking and captioning as needed, and classrooms are fitted with the latest Roger FM Soundfield systems.

Our program is flexible with students receiving as much or as little support as they need across various subjects and year levels. We aim to ensure that each student completes their education as empowered.
