

Privacy notice

When a student applies for a VET course, the student's school (Home School) will assist the relevant external provider (which includes a Delivery School and/or Registered Training Organisation (RTO)) with collecting student information for the purposes of assessing the application and placement of the students in VETDSS course. The Home School's career advisor or VET coordinator will also work together with students to upload their application information into a secure online portal managed by the WynBay Local Learning Education Network, which is funded by the Victorian government.

When a student is accepted into a VET course, the Home School may assist the relevant external provider with collecting necessary student personal and health information needed for enrolment with the external provider, supporting students' educational, social and wellbeing needs, medical emergencies and other purposes stated in the Schools' Privacy Policy.


Once the student is accepted into the course, in order to ensure the safety and wellbeing of students and others, the school may also share necessary student information such as emergency contacts, health plans, foreseeable risks, or reasonable adjustments that it holds with the chosen VET course external provider (which includes the RTO and Delivery School) and where permitted by law.

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MANY TALENTS ONE VCE

Dear Student

Victoria's senior secondary education is changing.

From 2023, the new VCE Vocational Major will replace *Intermediate and Senior VCAL*. This means the VCE will recognise different students equally. The new Victorian Pathways Certificate (VPC) will replace *Foundation VCAL*.

Students will have more education choices, a higher-quality curriculum and better workplace experiences – preparing them for further study, training at TAFE or work.

From 2023, more students will study the VCE. That is because the VCE will include the Vocational Major, a 2-year program that sits within the VCE. There will also be the Victorian Pathways Certificate for those who need flexibility in their learning. A new information and awareness campaign, Many Talents, One VCE will roll out explaining the changes.

The changes are a result of the <u>Review into Vocational and Applied Learning Pathways in Senior Secondary Schooling</u> (the Firth review). The review found we needed to improve vocational learning in schools. Schools currently offering VCAL will switch to the VCE Vocational Major from 2023. Some schools that do not offer VCAL will expand their options to include the VCE Vocational Major.

Now students will have greater access to high-quality, relevant vocational education and applied learning opportunities.

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VCE and VCE Vocational Major

About VCE and the VCE Vocational Major

- The VCE Vocational Major is a 2-year applied learning program within the VCE.
- You will develop academic and work-related skills, knowledge and confidence.
- It will prepare you for work and further education and training.
- When you graduate from secondary school, you'll graduate with the Victorian Certificate of Education, with the additional words 'Vocational Major'.

Victorian Pathways Certificate

About the Victorian Pathways Certificate (VPC)

- The Victorian Pathways Certificate is a flexible program. It is designed for a small number of students in years 11 and 12 who for various reasons, are not able or ready to undertake the VCE or the VCE Vocational Major.
- It will prepare you for work and further education and training, including the VCE.
- Your school can help you decide if the Victorian Pathways Certificate is right for you.

WHAT IS VET DELIVERED TO SECONDARY STUDENTS PROGRAM (VETDSS)?

Vocational Education and Training (VET) programs delivered to secondary school students are designed to expand opportunities and pathways for students and improve educational outcomes in line with the Victorian Government's objective to increase the number of young people completing Year 12 or equivalent. The skills you learn relate to a career pathway, so can apply them at work or in further education and training. You can add a VET course or certificate to your studies while you're at school.

From 2023, students will be able to include VET within the new VCE Vocational Major (VCE VM) and Victorian Pathways Certificate (VPC).

Incorporating VET in your VCE or VCE Vocational Major

VET can play an important role in senior secondary schooling. When you add VET to your VCE or VCE VM studies you gain practical skills in an industry you are interested in.

VET courses:

- provide a nationally recognised qualification in a specific industry, or provide credit towards one contribute towards the completion of your VCE
- allow you to study through School-Based Apprenticeships and Traineeships, which are often paid positions.

VET programs in the VCE and VCE Vocational Major:

There are a range of VET programs that you can select as part of your VCE or VCE Vocational Major. Please ask your school VET Coordinator or Careers Counsellor about the VET programs your school offers.

Combining VET with your Victorian Pathways Certificate (VPC)

VET plays an important role in the later years of secondary school. Adding VET to your Victorian Pathways Certificate (VPC) gives you practical work-related skills in a specific industry.

VET courses:

- Provide a nationally recognised qualification in a specific industry, or credit towards one.
- Contribute towards the completion of your VCE.
- Allow study through a School-Based Apprenticeships and Traineeships. These are often paid positions.

Talk to your school about how you can combine VET studies with your VPC.

Apprenticeships and traineeships at school

Your VCE or VCE Vocational Major can also include an apprenticeship or traineeship. You can also combine an apprenticeship or traineeship with your VPC. Starting an apprenticeship or traineeship while at school means you can get paid on-the-job training that leads to a qualification. School-based apprenticeships and traineeships give you the confidence and vocational skills that employers need.

VET credit in VCE, including the VM and the VPC

Students gain credit into their VCE, including the VM, and the VPC by undertaking:

- <u>VCE VET programs</u> that have been developed by the VCAA in consultation with stakeholders including industry. Information
 regarding the VCE credit available in each VCE VET program is published on the individual VCE VET program pages on this
 website.
- approved <u>apprenticeships and traineeships</u> that are in the same industry areas as designated VCE VET programs
- other VET qualifications, which provide credit into the VCE through block credit recognition

VET credit towards the VCE, including the VM

From 2023, the following policies will apply to VET credit towards the VCE, including the VM:

- Students can accrue VCE credit achieved through multiple VET qualifications at Certificate II level or above, up to a
 maximum of 180 nominal hours of completed units of competency (UoCs). This will give students two VCE units towards the
 VCE / VCE VM.
- Students who complete 180 nominal hours of UoCs in a certificate II or above, then move into another certificate III or above in the same industry* will accrue VCE credit at Unit 3–4 level for the next 180 nominal hours of completed UoCs.
- Students who complete 180 nominal hours of UoCs in a certificate II or above, receiving VCE Units 1 and 2 credit, and then enrol in an approved apprenticeship or traineeship will accumulate VCE credit from the apprenticeship/traineeship in the following order: Units 3, 4, 1, 2, 3, 4.

For example, a student completes 180 nominal hours of training in Certificate II in Kitchen Operations and receives VCE VET Hospitality Unit 1 and 2. The student then decides to move into a Certificate III in Carpentry SBAT. For their next 180 hours of training, they will receive VCE Units 3 and 4. Each additional 90 nominal hours of training would accrue VCE credit in the following order: Units 1, 2, 3, 4.

This policy applies to:


- all SBATs in certificates III or above
- certificate II traineeships that are in the same industry* as VCE VET programs drawn from certificate II qualifications that provide VCE Units 1–4 credit (typically trade pathways or pre-apprenticeship qualifications).

* Qualifications deemed to be in the same industry for VCE credit purposes are determined based on their Training Package Industry Code (e.g. BSB, SIT, AUR, etc.)

VET credit towards the VPC

From 2023, students will gain VET credit into the VPC in the following way:

- 90 nominal hours-worth of completed UoCs from a certificate I qualification or above will provide one credit towards the VPC.
- Students can accrue credit across multiple VET qualifications, up to a maximum of 180 hours. This will give students two units towards the VPC.



VET QUALIFICATIONS

Schools are able to offer senior secondary students VET qualifications selected from the range of industry areas approved by the VCAA.

Successful completion of VET in the VCE VM or VPC can provide students with:

- a VCE (including the VM), a VPC or VCAL certificate issued by the VCAA, and a VET certificate issued by a registered training organisation (RTO)
- two statements of results issued by the VCAA giving details of units completed in the VCE, VCE VM, VPC or VCAL and UoCs completed in the VET qualification
- an enhanced ATAR, which can improve access to further education
- pathways into employment and/or further VET qualifications or training
- workplace experience gained through structured workplace learning.

Students value VET because it:

- allows them to combine general and vocational studies which for many, provides a practical focus in a range of industry areas
- provides direct experience of business and industry
- enables them to explore training in areas that will enhance their pathway choices.

Employers value VET because it:

- contributes to the development of entry level skills for their industry
- provides students with a practical and focused introduction to workplace requirements
- enhances the employability of students
- enables industry to contribute to educational programs in schools
- enables industry to participate in local community networks.

GENERAL VETDSS PROGRAM INFORMATION

TRAVEL ARRANGEMENTS

Some students will be required to travel independently to and from the venue of the course they have chosen. Wednesday and Friday are the agreed VETDSS delivery time in the Wyndham VETDSS Cluster. There will be a cluster bus provided on these days. It travels to all the schools in Wyndham Cluster (bus times will be provided at the start of 2023).

When VET classes have finished for the day, all students must leave the HOST school's premises in a swift and timely manner.

STUDENT BEHAVIOUR OUTCOMES

Students will abide by the teacher's rules and the rules of the HOST School whenever they are on site. This includes meeting Occupational Health and Safety Requirements in and out of the classroom. Attitude and behaviour are to be of the expected standard.

Breaches of safety or serious offences will require students to be sent out of class. The HOST school VET Coordinator /RTO must communicate this by writing and phone to the HOME and HOST SCHOOL VET Coordinator where applicable on the day of the incident.

All incidents that occur relating to a student's behaviour must be escalated to Karen Kennedy (WynBay LLEN Partnership Manager) on the day of the incident so a course of action can be negotiated by all parties. All correspondence by all parties should be in writing. The action that might occur depending on the severity of the student's behaviour could result in a warning or a meeting between the Home School VET Coordinator, HOST school VET Coordinator, a parent, and the student.

A review of the student's continued participation in VET will be considered. Serious breaches in behaviour can result in an exclusion from VET.

DRESS CODE

Students are required to wear their Home School uniform when attending VET programs at delivery schools within the cluster. If attending University or TAFE students must comply with University / TAFE requirements. When students are completing a practical subject, students must bring their required safety or work clothes to the class and change once they have entered the school/venue. Students are not required to wear school uniform on SWL.

Please note if any student studying a trade arrives at their VET class without their correct clothing, they will be asked to leave class immediately. The HOME school VET Coordinator must be called when a student is asked to leave a VET class.

STUDENTS ABSENCES


Students are permitted a maximum of 2 absences per semester or 4 for the year. An additional 2 approved absences will be allowed per year for school camps, excursions etc. Any more absences may result in the student not satisfactorily completing the units/modules. Students need to notify their VET Co-ordinators, trainers and/or the workplace in advance.

STUDENT CHARGES FOR VET

Please be aware that there is a student charge for all VET programs. VET programs can be very expensive and so the cost of the program should be considered carefully before selecting a VET. Please see your VET Co-ordinator for charges for 2023. Please be aware that there is no REFUND if you do not withdraw from the VET program before the withdrawal Census date. Please see your VET Co-ordinator for details about withdrawing.

MINIMUM CLASS SIZES AND CHANGES TO PROGRAMS

Please be aware that if numbers are insufficient to meet a minimum class size the VET program will be withdrawn. Please note the following arrangements and course outlines are subject to change. Courses delivered at different sites may include modules which vary from the sample course outline included in this booklet. Students will be notified of changes prior to course commencement.





WHAT IS A STRUCTURED WORKPLACE LEARNING (SWL)?

SUMMARY

Structured Workplace Learning (SWL) experiences help students relate theory to a real-world work environment while developing their skills. SWL is a valuable component of all VET qualifications, and where possible should be spread across the duration of the VET program. It provides context for:

- enhancement of skills development
- practical application of industry knowledge
- assessment of units of competency/modules, as determined by the Registered Training Organisation
- increased employment opportunities.

In all cases, SWL is strongly recommended. Several VCE VET programs have a mandated SWL component. The SWL requirements are expressed in hours and weeks and are expected to be carried out over the duration of VCE VET programs.

SWL RECOGNITION

From 2023, SWL will also be available for students enrolled in the VCE VM or VPC. SWL recognition arrangements for these students are outlined in <u>SWL Recognition from 2023</u>.

When you complete SWL, you can gain extra units towards your VCE, VCE VM or VPC by completing SWL Recognition. This process gets you to reflect on your SWL experiences in a Workplace Learning Record and discuss these with your school. This also applies if you are undertaking a schoolbased apprenticeship or traineeship.

- WLRs for VCE VET programs are available for download on the relevant <u>VCE VET programs</u> page or via the WLR list on this webpage.
- The SBAT WLR is available for download on the <u>Apprenticeships</u> and <u>Traineeships</u> page.
- The WLR (General) and further advice about general work placement will be available on the VCAA webpage in January 2023.

A SWL assessment record must be filled out and signed by the assessor or teacher. This can be found on the <u>SWL</u> recognition assessment guidelines page.

SWL ARRANGEMENTS

All structured workplace learning arrangements must comply with <u>Ministerial Order 55 — Structured Workplace</u> <u>Learning Arrangements</u> and the accompanying arrangement forms must be used — refer to the <u>Resources</u> tab.

The Department has developed comprehensive guidance, on the <u>Guidance</u> tab, to support schools to comply with their obligations under Ministerial Order 55.

SWL ARRANGEMENT FORM

This <u>Structured Workplace Learning Arrangement Form</u> must be completed and signed before the structured workplace learning commences. It must be signed by:

- the employer
- the student
- the parent/guardian of the student if the student is under 18 years of age
- the Principal or Acting Principal this authority cannot be delegated to an Assistant Principal or other member of staff.

The Principal must ensure a copy of the signed Arrangement Form is provided to each party. The Principal should retain the original copy.

Variations or amendments to the Arrangement Form may only be made in writing and must be signed by the employer, student, parent/guardian (if the student is under 18 years of age) and the Principal.

SWL TRAVEL AND ACCOMMODATION FORM

The <u>Structured Workplace Learning Travel and</u> <u>Accommodation Form</u> must be used:

 if it is proposed that the student may need to undertake vehicle travel with their employer and/or supervisor during the arrangement, including travel toor-from the workplace • if the student is required to stay in accommodation other than their normal place of residence while undertaking structured workplace learning.

The <u>Structured Workplace Learning Travel and</u> <u>Accommodation Form</u> must be signed by:

- for travel both the employer and the parent/guardian — or the student if they are aged 18 years or over
- for accommodation the parent/guardian or the student if they are aged 18 years or over

OCCUPATIONAL HEALTH AND SAFETY

Principals must be satisfied that a student is either undertaking or has completed occupational health and safety (OHS) training prior to commencing structured workplace learning as follows:

- where a student is undertaking structured workplace learning as part of a VET program within the VCE VM or VPC— the principal must be satisfied that the student
 - is undertaking, or
 - has completed the OHS training unit of competency within the VET program.
- where a student is undertaking structured workplace learning which is not part of a VET program, or structured workplace learning which is not related to their VET program within VCE VM or VPC — the principal must be satisfied that the student has completed an OHS program required by the Department as follows:
 - if the student is undertaking VCE Industry and Enterprise — they must complete <u>safe@work</u>
 - if the student is undertaking VCE VM or VPC they must complete Work Related Skills Unit 1 and <u>safe@work.</u>

CHILD SAFE STANDARDS

To create and maintain a child safe organisation, all Victorian schools must comply with <u>Ministerial Order 870</u> — <u>Child Safe Standards</u>

Child Safe Standard 6 requires schools to develop and implement risk management strategies to ensure students' safety in the school environment.

The school environment includes workplace learning environments where students undertake:

- work experience
- structured workplace learning
- school community work/volunteering,

• and School Based Apprenticeships and Traineeships



These credits must be confirmed with the VET Coordinator at your school.





COURSE CODE: ACM20121 CERTIFICATE II IN ANIMAL CARE

Program Description:

This program provides training and skill development for the achievement of competencies in areas such as occupational health and safety, animal care, veterinary clinic duties, handling of animals and communication skills.

Pathways / Career Opportunities:

Successful completion of this program will provide participants with access to a range of entry-level employment opportunities in veterinary clinics, animal shelters, pet shops, companion animal services, or animal training services. This course is also the preferred prerequisite to continue study in ACM30110 Certificate III in Animal Studies.

- Major areas of study include:
- Working in the animal care industry
- Assisting with general care of animals
- First aid for animals.

Contribution to VCE / VCE VM & VPC


These credits must be confirmed with the VET Coordinator at your school.
